RALPH METCALFE

TRACK & FIELD

Known as the world's fastest human from 1932 to 1934, Ralph Metcalfe was the NCAA champion in the 100- and 200-yard events in 1932-1934 and broke or tied every world record from 40 to 220 yards.


He captured the AAU 200-meter title every year from 1932-1936 and also added the Central Collegiate Conference 100- and 220-yard crowns and the Drake Relays 100-yard honors in each of his three varsity seasons at Marquette. At one point in his college career, he had equaled or bettered 13 world records.

In Olympic competition, Metcalfe placed second in the 100 meters and third in the 200 meters in the 1932 games and competed again at the 1936 Olympics, finishing second in the 100 meters and helping the U.S. win the 400-meter relay.

After his college career, he joined the armed forces and served in World War II. Following his stint in the Army, Metcalfe lived a life of public service, becoming an alderman for the city of Chicago before being elected to the Illinois congress in 1970.

He was inducted into the National Track and Field Hall of Fame in 1975.



The record-setting 2002-03 campaign, which included numerous team and individual accomplishments, was highlighted by the program's third all-time appearance in the NCAA Final Four.

The Golden Eagles posted an overall record of 27-6 and claimed their first-ever Conference USA regular season championship after compiling a 14-2 league slate. The win total was the second-best in school history and marked the 27th occasion a Marquette squad collected 20-or-more wins in a year.

MU concluded the year ranked No. 9 in the final Associated Press poll following its historic run to the Final Four. After earning the No. 3 seed in the Midwest Region, Marquette opened play with a victory over Holy Cross and followed it up with a win against No. 24 Missouri.

Following a Sweet 16 matchup with No. 4 Pittsburgh, which resulted in a 77-74 win, the Golden Eagles advanced to a show down with top-ranked Kentucky. MU prevailed 83-69 as Dwyane Wade notched just the third triple-double in NCAA tournament history, earning a spot in the Final Four in New Orleans.

Marquette was led by All-America selection and Wooden Award Finalist Dwyane Wade. He was also named Conference USA Player of the Year, the first-ever player at the school to claim the award, and captured C-USA top defensive honors as well. Robert Jackson claimed second team all-league accolades in his lone season with MU and newcomer Steve Novak collected C-USA Sixth Man of the Year honors.

2007-08 Preview

Thanks in large part to a roster that features all five returning starters and 10 letterwinners from a successful 2006-07 campaign, expectations are at an all-time high for the Golden Eagles and ninth-year head coach Tom Crean.

Arguably the deepest team during the Crean era, Marquette features an impressive combination of experienced veterans, mixed with talented newcomers.

Marquette's trio of All-America candidates – Dominic James, Wesley Matthews and Jerel McNeal – highlight the 2007-08 roster. James and McNeal claimed all-conference accolades as sophomores and Matthews finished among the league leaders in three categories.

Senior Ousmane Barro and sophomore Lazar Hayward round out the group of returning starters. Barro chipped in 8.1 points and 6.9 rebounds per game last year and Hayward developed as the season progressed, concluding his debut season averaging 6.6 points and 3.6 boards per contest. Senior Dan Fitzgerald and sophomore David Cublilan combined for 100 3-pointers in 2006-07, allowing MU to feature each of its top seven scorers from a year ago.

Each of the three members of the latest recruiting class – Scott Christopherson, Patrick Hazel and Trevor Mbakwe – are expected to contribute during their respective freshman campaign, as the program enters its third season in the BIG EAST Conference.

The Golden Eagles will get a jump on the season by participating in a foreign tour in early September and a challenging non-conference slate, paired with the always-difficult BIG EAST campaign, will have MU battle tested and prepared for another extended postseason run.

Current Standouts



Marquette's 2007-08 roster features a trio of All-America candidates – Dominic James, Wesley Matthews and Jerel McNeal.

James garnered Associated Press Honorable Mention All-American accolades in 2006-07 after averaging 14.7 points, 4.9 assists and 3.1 rebounds per game. He was named to the All-BIG EAST First Team and was a finalist for the Naismith Award. The Richmond, Ind., native was tabbed BIG EAST Rookie of the Year in 2005-06 and has started each of the 65 career games in which he has played.



Matthews started each of the team's 34 games in 2006-07, posting season averages of 12.6 points and 5.3 boards per game. He finished among the BIG EAST leaders in three different categories and was the team's top free throw shooter, connecting on 77.0 percent of his chances. He collected 10-or-more points in 25 outings, including 16-of-18 to conclude the season.

McNeal enjoyed a breakthrough campaign as a sophomore, earning a spot on the all-conference second team and the league's defensive player of the year award. He contributed 14.7 points, 4.8 rebounds and 3.8 assists per game and concluded the campaign with 7.6 steals, the fifth-best single-season total in program history. The Chicago, Ill., native has started each of his 60 career games and owns career averages of 12.8 points, 4.6 rebounds, 3.2 assists and 2.3 steals per outing.

The squad's most experienced player, Ousmane Barro, has improved significantly in each of his three seasons at Marquette. He averaged 8.1 points and 6.9 rebounds per game in 2006-07, shooting a team-best 59.9 percent from the floor. The Dakar, Senegal, native was one of three players to start all 34 contests last season and as a result his production at both ends of the court increased. He reached double figures in points on 11 occasions and collected six double-doubles.
